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### **Uniform Crime Reporting System**

#### Overview

The Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program has been the starting place for law enforcement executives, students of criminal justice, researchers, members of the media and the public at large seeking information on crime in the nation. The program was conceived in 1929 by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) to meet the need for reliable uniform crime statistics for the nation. In 1930, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was tasked with collecting, publishing, and archiving those statistics.

Today, four annual publications, Crime in the United States, National Incident-Based Reporting System, Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted and Hate Crime Statistics are produced from data received from over 18,000 city, university/college, county, state, tribal and federal law enforcement agencies voluntarily participating in the program. The crime data are submitted either through a state UCR Program or directly to the FBI's UCR Program.

In addition to these reports, information is available on the Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) Program and the Hate Crime Statistics Program, as well as the traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS) and the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS).

### Arizona's UCR Program

The Arizona UCR program first began receiving voluntary crime statistics from local law enforcement agencies in January 1975. Prior to this date, agencies submitted their crime data directly to the FBI. The Arizona Department of Public Safety is responsible for administrating the UCR program and providing necessary assistance and training to the contributing law enforcement agencies.

After the 1992 Arizona legislative session, participation in the UCR program became mandatory. Arizona Revised Statute (A.R.S.) § 41-1750(A)(2) states that the Department of Public Safety shall:

"Collect information concerning the number and nature of offenses known to have been committed in this state and of the legal steps taken in connection with these offenses, such other information that is useful in the study of crime and in the administration of criminal justice and all other information deemed necessary to operate the statewide uniform crime reporting program and to cooperate with the federal government uniform crime reporting program."

Further, A.R.S. § 41-1750(D) states:

"The chief executive officers of law enforcement agencies of this state or its subdivisions shall provide to the central state repository such information as necessary to operate the statewide uniform crime reporting program and to cooperate with the federal government uniform crime reporting program."

Statistics are received from local police agencies, county sheriff's offices, college and university campus police, and state police agencies. Federal agencies and tribal police agencies do not report to the Arizona UCR program and therefore, are not included in this publication.

The goal of this publication is to identify the nature and extent of criminal activity in this state. This information will not in itself prevent crime, but it may encourage all segments of society, by understanding the problem, to work together with law enforcement agencies to reduce crime through more effective enforcement.

### **Crime Factors**

Statistics gathered under the UCR are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of Arizona and represent a spectrum of Arizona crime on statewide, local, and county levels. Awareness of the presence of certain crime statistics presented is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime-influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime developments of the community. Comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community. Population size is the only correlate of crime utilized in this publication. While the other factors listed above are of equal concern, no attempt is made to relate them to the data listed. The reader is, therefore, cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual reporting units from cities, counties, metropolitan areas, states, or colleges and universities solely based on their population coverage or student enrollment.

Set forth below are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Population density and degree of urbanization.
- Variations in composition of the population, particularly youth concentration.
- Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting patterns, and transient factors.
- Modes of transportation and highway systems.
- Economic conditions, including median income, poverty level, and job availability.
- Cultural factors and educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Family conditions with respect to divorce and family cohesiveness.
- Climate, including seasonal weather changes.
- The effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Citizens' attitudes toward crime.
- Crime reporting practices of the citizenry.
- 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic.

### Scoring of Offenses

Only the number of those offenses for Part I crimes and simple assault are scored (counted) under the UCR program. The method of scoring offenses varies with the type of crime committed, and it is important to remember that the number of offenders does not determine the number of offenses.

For murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, negligent manslaughter, rape, aggravated assault, and simple assault, one offense is scored for each victim, regardless of the number of offenders involved. For example, two offenders could be involved in the murder of one victim and, in this case, only one murder would be scored.

For robbery and larceny-theft, one offense is scored for each distinct operation which is separate in time and place. The number of victims in any one operation does not determine the number of offenses. For example, if seven patrons in a bar are robbed, only one robbery would be counted. However, if the offender then leaves the bar and robs a passer-by, a second offense would be counted.

For burglary, one offense is scored for each structure which is illegally entered. For UCR purposes, a structure is generally defined as an enclosed, permanently occupied area. However, when the structure is an apartment complex, business or office building in which units are leased for a period, one offense is counted for each unit burglarized. The illegal entry of those structures used for the housing of a transient population, such as hotel rooms or boarding houses, are scored as one burglary regardless of the number of rooms entered.

For motor vehicle theft, one offense is scored for each vehicle stolen. For UCR purposes, a motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land and not rails.

For arson, one offense is scored for each occurrence even if a more serious offense occurred as the result of the arson. Additionally, any attempts to commit any of the above offenses are also counted under the appropriate offense category except for attempted murder which is listed under aggravated assault.

For multiple offenses that occur in one crime incident, only the most serious offense is counted. The exceptions are arson and human trafficking (which is always counted) and a combination of larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft (the motor vehicle theft will be counted). Part I offenses are ranked according to seriousness and appear in order from most serious to least serious under Offense Definitions. A Part II offense that occurs in conjunction with Part I offenses or by itself is not counted.

#### Clearances

An offense is considered cleared (solved) when at least one offender is arrested for a crime, even though several may have been involved. Offenses may also be cleared by exceptional means when the offender: Commits suicide; makes a dying declaration; confesses while in custody or serving time for another crime; is prosecuted in another jurisdiction for the same offense; is a juvenile who is handled by notifying the parents; when the victim refuses to prosecute; or another jurisdiction refuses to extradite the offender. Clearances are counted as "adult" or "juvenile." A

"juvenile" clearance is counted only when juveniles are exclusively involved in the commission and clearance of an offense. If the arrest of both adults and juveniles results in a clearance, it is counted as an "adult" clearance only.

### **Property Stolen and Recovered**

The figures for the value of property stolen and recovered report the value at each point in time. Although property can increase in value over time, it is more likely that stolen property will be recovered in a damaged condition. Therefore, recovery value does not necessarily represent a "clearance rate" for stolen property, and one cannot use it to determine law enforcement effectiveness in recovering stolen goods.

Because stolen and recovered property figures indicate thefts and recoveries in the current year, it is important to note that recovered property may have been stolen in a previous year. In addition, the type and value of stolen or recovered property is reported only for Part I offenses and does not include such Part II offenses as fraud, forgery, or embezzlement.

#### **Arrests**

Arrest information is collected for all Part I and Part II offenses according to the age, sex, race, and ethnic origin of the offender. It is not possible, however, to correlate race or ethnic origin with the sex of the offender or specific ages because the information is collected independently, thus limiting analysis. Furthermore, arrest figures cannot be directly related to the number of crimes cleared because arrest totals count all the offenders who have been arrested even if several were involved in the commission of a single offense. Therefore, arrest and clearance totals will only be equal by coincidence.

It should be kept in mind that arrest totals do not indicate the number of different offenders involved in the commission of a crime. A total of four arrests may represent the arrest of four different offenders or the arrest of the same offender on four different occasions. Also, arrest totals do not indicate the number of charges placed against an offender at the time of the arrest.

#### **UCR Offense Information**

In Arizona's UCR Program, contributing law enforcement agencies are wholly responsible for compiling their own crime reports and submitting them to the Arizona Department of Public Safety's Access Integrity Unit. To maintain quality and uniformity in data received, the Access Integrity Unit furnishes to the contributing agencies continuous training and instruction in UCR procedures. All contributors are also furnished with the FBI's Summary Reporting System (SRS) User Manual which outlines in detail procedures for scoring and classifying offenses. Monthly, law enforcement agencies (state, county and local) report the number of offenses that become known to them during the month.

For practical purposes, the reporting of offenses known is limited to the following crime classifications because they are the most serious and most commonly reported crimes occurring in all areas of the United States. Together, they serve as a gauge of the level and scope of crimes occurring across the country. They are divided into two parts: Part I and Part II. Information on the number of Part I offenses known to law enforcement, the number of clearances, and the number of persons arrested is reported each month. Only arrest data is reported for Part II offenses.

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### National Incident-Based Reporting System

#### Overview

Due to a rapidly changing data processing environment, the FBI UCR Program and its partners within the law enforcement community recognized the need for a more detail-oriented crime data collection. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) was implemented in 1989 to improve the quantity and quality of crime data collected by law enforcement by capturing more detailed information on each single crime occurrence. It was designed for law enforcement at its request. The NIBRS does not require law enforcement to collect additional data, but simply to delineate and use data already being collected. The NIBRS provides a more comprehensive view of crime in the United States and offers greater flexibility in data compilation and analysis.

The NIBRS captures specific details about crimes and criminals through incident-based reporting. These details include the date, time, location, and circumstance of the incident. Additionally, characteristics of the victim and offender such as the age, sex, race, and ethnicity are collected along with information about their relationship; any involvement of weapons or drugs; details of property loss; whether the crime was motivated by bias; and if a computer was utilized to perpetuate certain types of crimes. Additionally, the NIBRS provides more robust information on officer assaults. Other enhancements to the NIBRS include a collection of cargo theft data, human trafficking offenses, animal cruelty, expansion of the property and location codes, and redefining the race and ethnicity codes. When used to its full potential, the NIBRS identifies when and where crime occurs, what form it takes, and the characteristics of its victims and offenders.

### The Benefits of the NIBRS

The NIBRS produces more detailed, accurate, and meaningful data than the Summary Reporting System. Armed with such information, law enforcement can better make a case to acquire the resources needed to fight crime. It has the capability of furnishing information on nearly every major criminal justice issue facing law enforcement today, including terrorism, white-collar crime, weapons offenses, missing children where criminality is involved, drug/narcotics offenses, drug involvement in all offenses, hate crimes, spousal abuse, elderly abuse, child abuse, domestic violence, juvenile crime/gangs, parental kidnapping, organized crime, pornography, driving under the influence, and alcohol-related offenses.

Using the NIBRS, legislators, municipal planners/administrators, academicians, sociologists, and the public will have access to more comprehensive crime information than the traditional Summary Reporting System can provide. The NIBRS also enables agencies to find similarities in crime-fighting problems so that agencies can work together to develop solutions or discover strategies for addressing the issues.

Participation of local law enforcement agencies in NIBRS is important for producing a highly accurate representation of crime. Crime data accuracy and completeness provide important snapshots of crime at all levels of law enforcement: local, regional, county, state, and national. The crucial starting point of this crime reporting process is at the local level.

The vision for the NIBRS is to become the law enforcement community's standard for quantifying crime, further supporting the mission of the FBI UCR Program, which is "provides national crime data management standards and services to inform, educate, and strengthen communities through Uniform Crime Reporting."

In 2003, Arizona began moving from summary-based reporting to incident-based reporting by obtaining a state-level NIBRS repository. In August of 2004, Arizona became certified to report crime data through the NIBRS by the FBI. Currently, there are 22 local agencies who have been certified as meeting all the requirements for NIBRS reporting and are now submitting NIBRS-only data.

### NIBRS vs. Summary Reporting System

Most of the general concepts for collecting, scoring and reporting UCR data in the Summary Reporting System Manual (2013) remain applicable in the NIBRS. For example, the jurisdictional rules for collecting data from city, county, state, tribal and federal law enforcement agencies, and the conditions under which a state UCR Program must operate remain the same. *The NIBRS User Manual* (2021.1), provides a comprehensive look at the NIBRS and combines the old requirements retained from the traditional UCR Program with the new NIBRS requirements.

The NIBRS has much more detail in its reporting system than the traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS). In the NIBRS, agencies collect offense information on 52 crimes known as Group A offenses; in the Summary Reporting System, agencies collect offense information on eight crimes known as Part I offenses.

In the SRS, the "Hierarchy Rule" governs multiple offense reporting. If more than one crime was committed by the same person or group of persons and the time and space intervals separating the crimes were insignificant, then the crime highest in the hierarchy is the only offense reported. However, in the NIBRS, if more than one crime was committed by the same person or group of persons and the time and space intervals were insignificant, all the crimes are reported as offenses within the same incident.

The SRS has two crime categories: Crimes Against Persons (e.g., murder, rape, and aggravated assault) and Crimes Against Property (e.g., robbery, burglary, and larceny-theft). In the NIBRS, a third crime category was added, Crimes Against Society, to represent society's prohibitions against certain types of activities (e.g., drug or narcotic offenses).

The NIBRS collects information about crimes committed using a computer; the SRS does not. The NIBRS collects more comprehensive data about drug offenses than the SRS.

### **NIBRS Offense Information**

NIBRS is an incident-based reporting system designed to collect data on each single crime occurrence and on each incident and arrest within the occurrence. The most significant difference between NIBRS and the traditional UCR system is the degree of detail in reporting.

Unlike the current, or summary, UCR system that collects only eight Part I crimes, NIBRS collects 24 Group A crime categories made up of 52 Group A offenses. In addition to the Group A offenses,

there are 10 Group B offense categories. They encompass all the crimes not considered Group A offenses.

Law enforcement agencies use data elements and data values to report data to the FBI UCR Program via the NIBRS. Additional information about reporting requirements and specifications for submitting data to the NIBRS is in the NIBRS Technical Specification A data element is the smallest named item of data that conveys meaningful information or condenses a lengthy description into a shortcode.

Law enforcement agencies should use a series of the 58 established data elements, i.e., data fields, within each segment of the Group A Incident Report and in the Group B Arrest Report to describe the details of each component of a crime.

Effective January 1, 2021, the FBI UCR Program has transitioned the historic SRS data collection to a NIBRS-only data collection.

Until the Arizona UCR Program can collect a preponderance of data via the NIBRS, it will continue to convert the NIBRS statistics it receives to the traditional SRS format for the annual *Crime in Arizona* publication.


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### Arizona's Crime Clock

The Arizona Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregated representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the offenses. This model of the display should not be taken to imply regularity in the commission of offenses; rather, it represents the annual ration of crime to affixed time intervals.

### **State Crime Summary**

#### Crime Index

- There were 178,678 Crime Index Offenses reported in 2020.
- January recorded the highest incidence of offenses with 22,194 while February recorded the lowest incidence of offenses with 14,039.
- The value of property stolen was \$174,260,332.
- The value of property recovered was \$48,938,034 for a recovery rate of 28.1 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 10.0 percent of the total stolen property and 47.0 percent of the total recovered property.
- The crime rate for 2020 for Arizona was 2,487.9 crimes per 100,000 population based on an estimated population of 7,181,795.

### Arrests/Clearances

- During 2020, a total of 37,315 persons were arrested for index offenses.
- Adult index arrests were 34,590 and juvenile arrests were 2,725.
- Males accounted for 71.7 percent of the index arrests and females accounted for 28.3 percent.
- There were 34,637 clearances, or 19.39 percent, of index offenses reported in 2020.

### **Violent Crime Summary**

#### Offenses

- There were 28,777 violent crimes reported in 2020.
- Violent crimes accounted for 16.10 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The highest number of violent crimes was reported in August with 2,722 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 1,246 offenses.
- Aggravated assault accounted for the largest incidence of violent crimes with 19,751 offenses while Human Trafficking accounted for the smallest with 26 offenses.
- The value of property stolen was \$174,411,868.
- The crime rate was 395.5 offenses per 100,000 population.

### Arrests/Clearances

- There were 10,885 arrests for violent crimes in 2020.
- Adult arrests were 10,001 and juvenile arrests were 884.
- Males accounted for 80.0 percent and females accounted for 20.0 percent.
- There were 10,298 clearances, or 35.79 percent, of violent crimes reported in 2020.

### **Property Crime Summary**

### Offenses

- There were 149,901 property crimes reported in 2020.
- Property crimes accounted for 83.9 percent of the total crime index.
- The highest number of property crimes was reported in December with 14,774 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 9,329 offenses.
- Larceny-Theft accounted for the largest incidence of property crimes with 111,631 offenses while arson accounted for the smallest with 1,074 offenses.
- The value of property stolen was \$174,260,332.
- The crime rate was 2,062.1 offenses per 100,000 population.

### Arrests/Clearances

- There were 26,430 arrests for property crimes in 2020.
- Adult arrests were 24,589 and juvenile arrests were 1,841.
- Males accounted for 68.3 percent and females accounted for 31.7 percent.
- There were 24,338 clearances, or 16.24 percent, of property crimes reported in 2020.

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# Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter

#### Definition

Murder is defined as the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. The classification of this offense is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. The UCR Program does not include the following situations in this offense classification: deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident; justifiable homicides; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.


#### 2020 Summary

- There were 423<sup>1</sup> murders reported during 2020.
- Murder accounted for 0.24 percent of the total index offenses and 1.47 percent of the total violent crimes.
- October recorded the highest number with 49, while February recorded the lowest with 19.
- Firearms (including handguns, rifles, shotguns, etc.) were used in 69.50 percent of the murders.
- In murders where the relationship between the victim and offender was known, 15.60 percent were acquaintances.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$16,210.

- A total of 351 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 331 arrests and juveniles accounted for 20 arrests.

# Murders by Month



#### Definition

Rape is defined as penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. Assaults or attempts to commit forcible rape are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not counted in this category.



# Robbery

#### Definition

Robbery is defined as the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force or threat of force and/or by putting the victim in fear. Robbery involves theft or larceny but is aggravated by the element of force or threat of force.

#### 2020 Summary

- There were 5,739 robberies reported during 2020.
- Robbery accounted for 3.21 percent of the total index offenses and 19.94 percent of the violent crimes.
- December recorded the highest number with 619, while February recorded the lowest with 241.
- Robberies occurring on highways (streets, alleys, and sidewalks) recorded the highest number, with 1,511 or 26.33 percent of all robberies.
- Bank robberies had the lowest number, with 89, or 1.55 percent of all robberies.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$2,467,316.
- Robberies occurring on residences had the highest total dollar loss of \$745,689.
- Bank robberies had the highest dollar loss per robbery of \$1.209.
- Strong-Arm (Hand, Feet, Etc.) represented the most common weapon used in 2,305 robberies or 40.2 percent.

- A total of 1,736 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 1,475 arrests and juveniles accounted for 261 arrests.
- Males accounted for 1,490 arrests or 85.8 percent, and females accounted for 246 arrests or 14.2 percent.
- Of those persons arrested, 63.7 percent were White, 27.7 percent were Black, 7.9 percent were American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.5 percent were Asian, and 0.2 percent were Pacific Islander.
- Hispanics accounted for 39.7 percent of the arrests.
- There were 1,511 clearances for robbery reported in 2020.

# **Aggravated Assault**

#### Definition


Aggravated assault is defined as the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Assaults that do not involve the use of a firearm, knife or cutting instrument, or other dangerous weapon and in which the victim did not sustain serious or aggravated injuries are reported as Other Assaults – Simple, not aggravated.

#### 2020 Summary


- There were 19,751 aggravated assaults reported in 2020.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 11.05 percent of the total index offenses and 68.6 percent of the violent crimes.
- August recorded the highest number with 1,982, while February recorded the lowest with 834.
- Firearms represented the most common weapon used in 7,149 aggravated assaults or 36.2 percent.
- Physical weapons (hands, fists, feet) were used in 24.9 percent, and firearms were used in 36.2 percent of reported aggravated assaults.
- There were 22,896 simple assaults reported in 2020. Simple assault is primarily differentiated from aggravated assault by the seriousness of the injury and the weapon used. Simple assault is not a Crime Index offense but is reported here for the purpose of showing the total assault violence.

- A total of 8,423 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 7,849 arrests and juveniles accounted for 574 arrests.
- Males accounted for 6,558 arrests or 77.9 percent, and females accounted for 1,865 arrests or 22.1 percent.
- Of those persons arrested, 69.7 percent were White, 20.9 percent were Black, 8.7 percent were American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.6 percent were Asian, and 0.1 percent were Pacific Islander.
- Hispanics accounted for 32.6 percent of the arrests.
- There were 8,112 clearances for aggravated assault reported in 2020.

# **Burglary**

#### **Definition**

Burglary is defined as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. To classify an offense as a burglary, the use of force to gain entry need not have occurred. The UCR Program has three sub-classifications for burglary: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry. The UCR definition of "structure" includes apartment, barn, house trailer or houseboat when used as a permanent dwelling, office, railroad car (but not automobile), stable, and vessel (i.e., ship).

### 2020 Summary

- There were 21,390 burglaries reported during 2020.
- Burglary accounted for 11.97 percent of the total index offenses and 14.3 percent of the property crimes.
- January recorded the highest number with 2,141, while February recorded the lowest with 1,321.
- Forcible entry was used in 10,292, or 48.1 percent of the total burglaries.
- Residential burglaries accounted for 12,259 or 57.3 percent of the total burglaries.
- In burglaries where the time of occurrence was known, 9,002 or 42.09 percent occurred between the hours of 06:00 AM and 06:00 PM.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$32,952,611.
- Residential burglaries accounted for the highest property loss of \$19,079,130.

- A total of 3,483 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 3,146 arrests and juveniles accounted for 337 arrests.
- Males accounted for 2,899 arrests or 83.2 percent, and females accounted for 584 arrests or 16.8 percent.

# Larceny-Theft

#### Definition

Larceny-Theft is defined as the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts, and accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.

#### 2020 Summary

- There were 111,631 larceny-thefts reported during 2020.
- Larceny-Theft accounted for 62.48 percent of the total index offenses and 74.47 percent of the property crimes.
- January recorded the highest number with 10,723, while February was the lowest with 7.165.
- Larceny-Theft in the over \$200 category reported the highest number of incidents with 45,052 or 40.4 percent.
- Shoplifting accounted for 38,361 larceny-thefts or 34.3 percent.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$59,980,889.

- A total of 21,069 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 19,848 arrests and juveniles accounted for 1,221 arrests.
- Males accounted for 13,699 arrests, or 65.0 percent and females accounted for 7,370 arrests or 35.0 percent.

# **Motor Vehicle Theft**

#### Definition

Motor Vehicle Theft is defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. This definition excludes the taking for temporary use by those persons having lawful access to the vehicle. For UCR purposes, a motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land and not on rails. Motor vehicle theft does not include farm equipment, bulldozers, airplanes, construction equipment, or watercraft such as motorboats, sailboats, houseboats, or jet skis. The taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by persons having lawful access is excluded from this definition.

#### 2020 Summary

- There were 15,806 motor vehicle thefts reported during 2020.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 8.85 percent of the total index offenses and 10.5 percent of the property crimes.
- December recorded the highest number with 1,460, while February recorded the lowest with 767.
- Autos represented the highest single category of motor vehicle theft with 10,511 or 66.5 percent.
- The total dollar loss amounted to \$78,943,778. This includes not only the value of the stolen motor vehicle, but any other personal property reported stolen during the incident.


#### Arrests/Clearances

- A total of 1,680 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 1,417 arrests and juveniles accounted for 263 arrests.
- Males accounted for 1,274 arrests or 75.8 percent, and females accounted for 406 arrests or 24.2 percent.
- Of those persons arrested, 82.2 percent were White, 12.9 percent were Black, 4.3 percent were American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.5 percent were Asian, and 0.1 percent were Pacific Islander.
- Hispanics accounted for 36.1 percent of the arrests.
- There were 2,074 clearances for motor vehicle theft reported in 2020.


#### **Recovered Motor Vehicles**

#### Definition


The FBI UCR Program defines arson as any willful or malicious burning or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only the fires that investigation determined to have been willfully set are included in this arson data collection. Fires labeled as suspicious or of unknown origin are excluded from these data.


- There were 1,074 arsons reported during 2020.
- Arson accounted for 0.6 percent of the total Index offenses and 0.7 percent of the property crimes.
- July recorded the highest number with 126, while February recorded the lowest with 54.
- Structural arson accounted for 355 offenses or 33.1 percent.
- Mobile arson accounted for the highest single known category with 163, while Storage Structure arson was the lowest with 12.
- The total estimated value of property damage amounted to \$15,114,224.
- Industrial/Manufacturing structures had the highest dollar loss at \$8,210,931.

# **Human Trafficking**

#### Definition

Human Trafficking is defined into two categories:


- 1) Commercial Sex Acts Inducing a person by force, fraud, or coercion to participate in commercial sex acts, or in which the person induced to perform such act(s) has not attained 18 years of age.
- 2) Involuntary Servitude The obtaining of a person(s) through recruitment, harboring, transportation, or provision, and subjecting such persons by force, fraud, or coercion into involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery (not to include commercial sex acts).


- There were 26 human trafficking cases reported during 2020.
- Human trafficking cases accounted for 0.01 percent of the total index offenses and 0.08 percent of violent crimes.
- May recorded the highest number with 9, while February, March, April, and June recorded the lowest with 0.
- Of the total human trafficking cases reported, commercial sex acts accounted for 25 offenses and involuntary servitude accounted for 1 offense.

- A total of 79 persons were arrested in 2020.
- Adults accounted for 79 arrests and juveniles accounted for 0 arrests.

#### **Arrest Summary**

- There were 183,944 arrests reported in 2020.
- Arrests for Part I offenses were 37,315 or 20.29 percent.
- Arrests for Part II offenses were 146,629 or 79.71 percent.
- Adult arrests were 170,207 or 92.5 percent, and juvenile arrests were 13,737, or 7.5 percent.
- Males accounted for 133,942 arrests or 72.8 percent, and females accounted for 50,002, or 27.2 percent.
- Arrests for adults between the ages of 25-29 recorded the highest number with 32,177 or 17.5 percent of the total adult arrests.
- Arrests for juveniles age 17 were 3,389 or 24.7 percent of the total juvenile arrests.
- Of those persons arrested, 76.6 percent were White, 14.4 percent were Black, 7.9 percent were American Indian/Alaskan Native, 0.8 percent were Asian, and 0.2 percent were Pacific Islander.
- Hispanics accounted for 29.5 percent of the arrests.
- All Other (non-traffic) recorded the highest number of arrests of a specific offense with 101,422, or 55.1 percent of the total.







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## Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted

#### Overview

The data collected under the UCR-adjunct Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted (LEOKA) Program pertains to felonious deaths, accidental deaths, and assaults of duly sworn city, university and college, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement officers who, at the time of the incident, meet all the following criteria:

- Wear/carry a badge (ordinarily)
- Carry a firearm (ordinarily)
- Be duly sworn and have full arrest powers
- Be a member of a law enforcement agency
- Be acting in an official capacity, whether on or off duty, at the time of the incident; and
- If killed, death was directly related to the injuries received during the incident.

Also included are assaults which did not cause an injury; however, involved more than mere verbal abuse or minor resistance to arrest. The purpose of this data collection is to identify situations in which officers are killed or assaulted, describe the incidents statistically, and publish the data to aid agencies in developing policies to improve officer safety.

Deaths resulting from natural causes such as medical emergencies, suicides, or personal situations such as domestic violence or neighbor conflict situations are not included in the LEOKA Program.

Further information on officers killed in the line-of-duty may be found in the FBI's annual LEOKA report.


#### 2020 Summary

- There was a total of 2,605 police officers assaulted statewide in 2020.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists, and feet, were used in 1,817 assaults or 69.8 percent.
- The time period of 06:00 PM to 08:00 PM recorded the highest incidence of assaults with 353 or 13.6 percent.
- The highest number of assaults, 943, or 36.2 percent, occurred when officers were responding to all other calls.
- Personal injuries were sustained in 659 assaults or 25.3 percent.


#### Arrests/Clearances

There were 2,174 clearances for assaults on police officers reported in 2020. This represents a clearance rate of 83.4 percent.


### Officer Assaults Based on Injury vs. Non-injury

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### **Bias Crime Data**

#### Overview

On April 23, 1990, Congress passed the Hate Crime Statistics Act. This law required the Attorney General to collect data "about crimes that manifest evidence of prejudice based on race, religion, sexual orientation, or ethnicity." The Attorney General delegated the responsibilities of developing the procedures for implementing, collecting, and managing hate crime data to the Director of the FBI, who in turn assigned the tasks to the FBI UCR Program.

The UCR Program collects hate crime data regarding criminal offenses motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias against a race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender, or gender identity. Due to the difficulty of ascertaining the offender's subjective motivation, bias is to be reported only if the investigation reveals sufficient objective facts to lead a reasonable and prudent person to conclude that the offender's actions were motivated, in whole or in part, by bias.

In 1991, the Arizona legislature mandated the collection of bias crime statistics. A.R.S. § 41-1750(A)(3) was amended in part to read that the criminal identification section within the Department of Public Safety shall:

"Collect information concerning criminal offenses that manifest evidence of prejudice based on race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender or disability."

Due to the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act, the bias for disability, either physical or mental, was added to the national Bias Crime Statistical Program on January 1, 1997. The statewide collection began in January 1992.

# **Terms and Definitions**

Adult – For UCR purposes, a person 18 years or older.

Aggravated Assault – An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

**All Other Offenses** – All violations of state or local laws not specifically identified as Part I or Part II offenses, except traffic violations.

All Other Sex Offenses – All other offenses against common decency and morals. Includes statutory rape, indecent exposure, incest, and any other sex offenses not previously defined.

American Indian or Alaskan Native – A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

**Arson** – Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Assault – An unlawful attack by one person upon another.

**Autos** – Sedans, station wagons, coupes, convertibles, sport utility vehicles, minivans, and other similar motor vehicles that serve the primary purpose of transporting people from one place to another.

Asian or Pacific Islander – A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example, China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.

**Bias** – A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender, or gender identity.

Bias Crime \*- A committed criminal offense that is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias(es) against a race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender, or gender identity; also known as Hate Crime.

\*Even if the offender was mistaken in his or her perception that the victim was a member of the group he or she was acting against, the offense is still a bias crime because the offender was motivated by bias against the group.

**Black** – A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.

**Burglary** – The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.

Classifying – Determining the correct UCR Part I or Part II offense category based on police information

Cleared by Arrest – An offense that is cleared (solved) when at least one person is (1) arrested, (2) charged with the commission of the offense, and (3) turned over to the court for prosecution.

Cleared by Exceptional Means – For UCR purposes, an offense is considered exceptionally cleared when law enforcement has: (1) definitely established the identity of the offender, (2) there is enough information to support an arrest, charge, and turning over to the court for prosecution, (3) the exact location of the offender is known so the subject could be taken into custody, and yet (4) some reason outside law enforcement control prevents bringing the offender to court.

Constructive Possession – The condition in which a person does not have physical custody or possession but is in a position to exercise dominion or control over a thing.

**Conversion** – An unauthorized assumption and exercise of the right of ownership over goods or personal chattels belonging to another to the alteration of their condition or the exclusion of the owner's rights.

Crimes Against Persons – Includes the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.

**Crimes Against Property** – Includes the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

Crime Index – The total of eight offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation, and distribution of crime in a given geographical area. The Crime Index includes Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

**Criminal Homicide** – The willful killing of one human being by another.

Curfew and Loitering (Persons under age 18) – Violations by juveniles of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

**Disorderly Conduct** – Any behavior that tends to disturb the public peace or decorum, scandalize the community, or shock the public sense of morality.

**Driving Under the Influence** — Driving or operating a motor vehicle or common carrier while mentally or physically impaired as the result of consuming an alcoholic beverage or using a drug or narcotic.

Drug Abuse Violations – The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution, and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation, or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and the making of narcotic drugs.

**Drunkenness** – To drink alcoholic beverages to the extent that one's mental faculties and physical coordination are substantially impaired. Exclude driving under the influence.

**Embezzlement** – The unlawful misappropriation or misapplication by an offender to his/her own use or purpose of money, property, or some other thing of value entrusted to his/her care, custody, or control.

Forcible Rape – The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.

Forgery and Counterfeiting – The altering, copying, or imitating of something without authority or right, with the intent to deceive or defraud by passing the copy or thing altered or imitated as that which is original or genuine; or the selling, buying, or possession of an altered, copied, or imitated thing with the intent to deceive or defraud.

**Forcible Rape** – The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. This definition is now only used for historical trend purposes.

Forgery and Counterfeiting – The making, altering, using, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

**Fraud** – The intentional perversion of the truth for the purpose of inducing another person or other entity in reliance upon it to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right. Fraudulent conversion and obtaining of money or property by false pretenses.

**Gambling** – To unlawfully bet or wager money or something else of value; assist, promote, or operate a game of chance for money or some other stake; possess or transmit wagering information; manufacture, sell, purchase, possess, or transport gambling equipment, devices or goods; or tamper with the outcome of a sporting event or contest to gain a gambling advantage.

**Hate Crime** – See Bias crime.

Hierarchy Rule — When more than one Part I offense is classified, the law enforcement agency must locate the offense that is highest on the hierarchy list and score that offense and not the other offense in the multiple-offense situation. There is a significance to the order in which the Part I offenses are presented, with murder being the highest in the hierarchy and arson being the lowest. The offenses of justifiable homicide, motor vehicle theft, and arson are exceptions to the Hierarchy Rule.

**Hispanic** – A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

**Hotel Rule** – A standard UCR scoring practice which limits to one the number of burglaries which can be counted when more than one room is entered for the purpose of committing a felony or theft within a structure generally intended to house a transient population.

**Human Trafficking, Commercial Sex Acts** – Inducing a person by force, fraud, or coercion to participate in commercial sex acts, or in which the person induced to perform such act(s) has not attained 18 years of age.

**Human Trafficking, Involuntary Servitude** – The obtaining of a person(s) through recruitment, harboring, transportation, or provision, and subjecting such persons by force, fraud, or coercion into involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery (not to include commercial sex acts).

**Incident-Based Reporting** – A less restrictive and more expansive method of collecting crime data (as opposed to Summary Reporting) in which all the data elements associated with an offense or arrest are compiled on an incident to incident basis.

**Justifiable Homicide** – The killing of a felon by a peace officer in the line of duty or the killing of a felon, during the commission of a felony, by a private citizen.

Juvenile – For UCR purposes, any person under the age of 18.

**Juvenile Clearance** – Offenses involving only persons under the age of 18 that are cleared by arrest or exceptional means.

**Larceny-Theft** – The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

**Liquor Laws** – The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness.

Manslaughter by Negligence – The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Motor Vehicle – A self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails.

**Motor Vehicle Theft** – The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

**Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter** – The willful (Nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

Offenses Against the Family and Children – Unlawful nonviolent acts by a family member (or legal guardian) which threaten the physical, mental, or economic well-being or morals of another family member and which are not classifiable as other offenses, such as Assault or Sex Offenses.

Other (Simple) Assaults – An unlawful attack or attempted attack upon another which does not result in serious injury to the victim and which does not involve the use of a dangerous weapon.

Other Vehicles – All other vehicles that meet the UCR definition for motor vehicles such as snowmobiles, motorcycles, motor scooters, trail bikes, mopeds, golf carts, and all-terrain vehicles.

**Part I Offenses** – The first of two main groupings of UCR crime classifications consisting of the eight Index crimes.

Part II Offenses – The second of two main groupings of crime classifications consisting of all other crime categories not already designated as Part I, excluding traffic violations. Except for simple assault, the monthly reporting of Part II offenses is limited to arrest information only in the Summary Reporting System.

**Prostitution and Commercialized Vice** – The unlawful promotion of or participation in sexual activities for profit.

Rape – Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

**Robbery** – The taking or attempted taking of anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Runaways (Persons under age 18) – Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under the provisions of local statutes. Runaways is no longer required by the FBI UCR Program.

Scoring – Counting the number of offenses committed after the police report has been classified.

**Separation of Time and Place Rule** – A standard UCR scoring practice that stipulates if there is a separation of time and place between the commission of several crimes, the reporting agency must handle each crime as a separate incident and must classify and score each offense individually.

Sex Offenses – Offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like.

Simple Assault – All assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an aggravated nature and do not result in serious injury to the victim.

**Stolen Property: Buying, Receiving, Possessing** – Buying, receiving, possessing, selling, concealing, or transporting any property with the knowledge that it has been unlawfully taken, as by burglary, embezzlement, fraud, larceny, robbery, etc.

**Structure** – Includes, but is not limited to, apartments, barns, cabins, churches, condominiums, dwelling houses, factories, garages, house trailers or houseboats (used as a permanent dwelling), mills, offices, other buildings, outbuildings, public buildings, railroad cars, rooms, schools, stables, vessels (ships), and warehouses.

Summary Reporting – A method of collecting crime data adopted for national reporting purposes in which a limited amount of data associated with an offense or arrest is compiled by each contributing agency.

Suspicion – Arrested for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.

**Trucks and Buses** – Vehicles specifically designed (but not necessarily used) to commercially transport people and cargo.

**Unfounded** – False or baseless complaints.

Vagrancy – The violation of a court order, regulation, ordinance, or law requiring the withdrawal of persons from the streets or other specified areas; prohibiting persons from remaining in an area or place in an idle or aimless manner; or prohibiting persons from going from place to place without visible means of support.

**Vandalism** – To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

**Weapons: Carrying, Possessing, Etc.** – The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.

White – A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa or the Middle East.

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
