AZSOMB Juvenile Subcommittee proposed definition

Problematic Sexual Behavior (PSB) refers to actions involving sexual body parts in children and youth under 18, both adjudicated and non-adjudicated, that exceed typical, age-appropriate sexual development (such as standard curiosity or "playing doctor") and cause—or carry a risk of causing—harm to the individual or others. Said youth are a diverse population who engage in such behavior for a variety of reasons.

Key Characteristics

- **Developmental Inappropriateness:** Manifests as intrusive, frequent, or persistent behaviors that do not align with typical developmental stages and do not respond to standard parental guidance or intervention.
- **Coercion & Power Imbalances:** Involves aggressive or intrusive actions, non-consensual behavior, or interactions between youth of significantly disparate ages, sizes, or developmental abilities.
- **Harmful & Non-Consensual Acts:** Encompasses non-consensual sexual acts, sexual behavior with someone substantially younger, excessive pornography consumption, and the viewing, sending, or sharing of nude photographs of oneself or another minor.
- **Underlying Complexities:** Rarely occurs in isolation; it is frequently tied to broader emotional or behavioral challenges within a diverse population of youth.

Please see draft MDT definition below. This was derived out of the Colorado work.

The Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) is a collaborative group formed after a juvenile has been adjudicated or given a deferred adjudication and referred to probation, parole, or out-of-home placement. The team is built around each individual juvenile and may change over time as their needs evolve. Core members typically include the supervising officer, treatment provider, DHS caseworker, victim representative, school personnel, parents or caregivers, and the juvenile, with additional members added when necessary—such as polygraph examiners, therapeutic providers, or specialists supporting developmental or intellectual disabilities. Each member contributes unique information and perspectives to support a coordinated approach to evaluation, treatment, supervision, and accountability.

Multidisciplinary Team Proposed Definition

A Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) for youth with problematic sexual behaviors is an integrated, collaborative group of professionals from diverse fields alongside the youth and their family, who pool specialized expertise to assess, plan, and deliver a unified treatment and supervision response.

- **Core Purpose:** To collaboratively develop, coordinate, and reach consensus on the type and intensity of care required to address problematic sexual behaviors in children and youth, including those who are juvenile justice-involved or wards of the state.
- **Team Composition:** Includes the child/youth and their parents or legal guardians, alongside key professionals such as therapists, caseworkers, and juvenile probation officers. Input from additional specialists—such as school staff or psychiatric providers—is included as needed.
- **Collective Accountability:** Members share mutual responsibility for assisting the youth and family in reaching treatment goals through a highly coordinated, integrated response.
